Dear Fellow Parishioners,

The Vestry held its monthly meeting Monday, March 17th. It was a bittersweet experience to have Glenn call us to order for his last meeting. I'm sure I speak for the entire Vestry when I say that it has been a privilege to have been able to share this special time with him. Thank you all for that.

The most substantive issue discussed at our meeting was our search for a Youth Director. In February the Vestry voted unanimously to proceed with the search, and last Monday we discussed some fine-tuning of the job description and ideas for keeping our young members engaged until the search is completed. The diocese has commissioned a new Youth Missioner, and members of St. Mary's are in conversation with her about programming and job-posting.

It is my hope that Canon Hunn and Bishop Marble will be able to join the vestry at its next meeting on April 21st. I feel somewhat like a broken record when I report to you that a meeting WILL take place and that the Vestry WILL communicate to everyone when "next steps" are determined. However, that's all that can be said for the moment. St. Mary's is a wonderful parish with a true sense of mission and direction. We will be attractive to many, many excellent interim and rector candidates. Let's not let the absence of a detailed road map distract us from the vision of the wonderful destination that awaits us.

Goodbye from Glenn

Dear Members of St. Mary's,

January 18, 1981, the date of my first service at St. Mary's, appears from most perspectives to have been a long time ago, yet from others, a recent memory. As I have pondered my impending retirement, it often seems incomprehensible that I have been your rector for over twenty-seven years. But then, I will officiate at the wedding of a young woman I remember from the Cherub Choir, or preside at a baptism for the infant son of a young man who was not much more than an infant himself when first we met, and the evidence of time's passage speaks for itself.

Sunday, March 30, was my last Sunday, and my last day, as your rector. We have been through much together: joy, sadness, celebration, sickness, death, birth, controversy, achievement, disappointment, success, and much more. The blessing of being a long-term pastor, as I have been with you, is that it draws us deeply into the exigencies of life, and as a result the bonds of friendship grow ever stronger. It will be difficult for Kathy and me to leave you, but we know that this is the right decision at the right time, for St. Mary's and for us.

Custom requires that I excuse myself from future priestly and pastoral duties at St. Mary's, in order to allow your next rector unhampered opportunity to establish an effective ministry among you. I hope that you will—as I do—appreciate that while this is a difficult policy, it is absolutely essential and necessary for all of us as we move into the future that lies before us.

Kathy and I want to thank you for the exceptional and memorable retirement celebration and reception that you provided for us. We are most grateful for those who planned them, for those who were present, for the gifts received, and for the generous words that were spoken; but we are especially grateful for all that you have meant to us, that large space you will forever occupy in our hearts, and for the kindness and support you have bestowed upon us over these past twenty-seven years.

As I expressed at the retirement dinner: On April 1, I will no longer be your rector; but you and I will always be friends.

May God's grace and peace span the distance that now separates us,

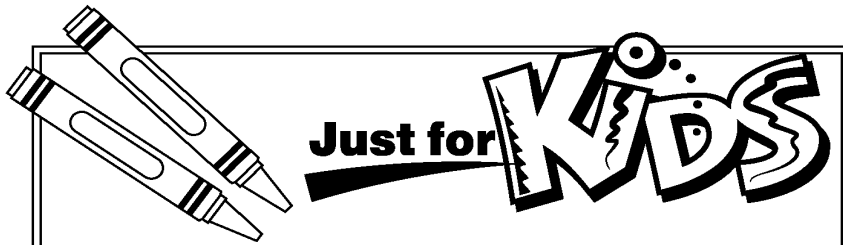

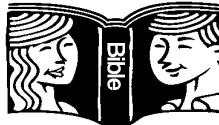

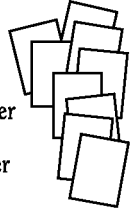

Make a Prayer Calendar

We should pray everyday. There are so many people and so many things to pray about in our lives. "Make a date" to pray every day and stick to it!

What you need:

- 12 pieces of blank paper for calendar pages
- a pencil, pen or marker
- a ruler



What you do:

1. Write the name of the month on the top of a sheet of paper.
2. With your ruler and pencil, draw vertical (up and down) lines to divide the page into 7 columns.
3. Draw horizontal (left to right) lines to make 5 rows.
4. You should have 35 boxes.
5. Number the boxes to match the dates of the month. (Tip: Use another calendar to look at, so you put the numbers in the correct boxes.)
6. Repeat the steps to make a calendar page for each month of the year.
7. On this month's calendar, fill in the spaces with people, events and things you need to pray for. They can repeat.
8. When each day comes, pray about what's on that day's space.
9. Before the end of the month take time to fill in next month's calendar. You may be able to see God's answering your prayers, so be sure to add "thankfulness" to your list.
