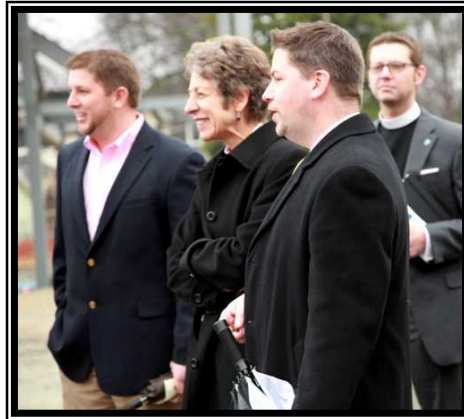

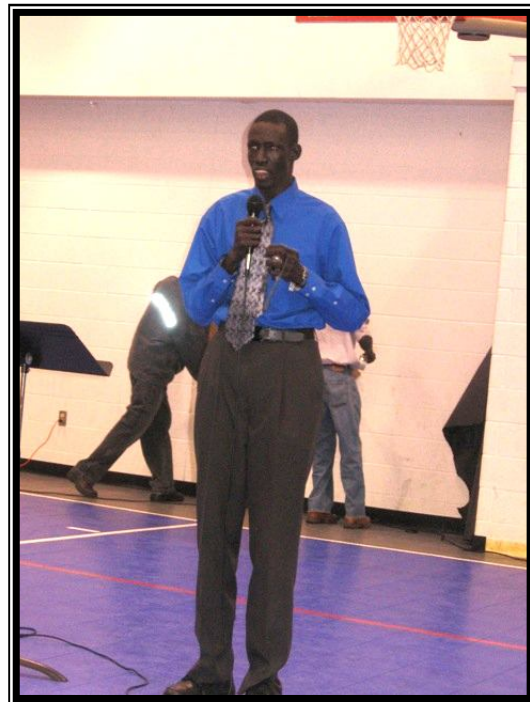

HOW DID STEPHEN MINISTRY BEGIN?

Stephen Ministry was started by the Rev. Dr. Kenneth Haugk, a pastor and clinical psychologist in St. Louis, Missouri in 1975. Haugk's idea was to train parishioners in pastoral skills to help meet the many needs for care in his congregation; we met Rev. Haugk at the conference!

His idea was so successful that other churches became interested, and Haugk founded the Stephen Ministries organization. Stephen Ministry is now a worldwide ecumenical organization, with 11,000+ enrolled congregations in 25 countries spanning Africa, Europe, Asia, North and Central America! There are 11,000+ enrolled congregations or other organizations from 159 denominations, covering all 50 states and 10 Canadian provinces. For further information, visit www.stephenministries.org.

Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper

Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper

February 21, 2012 - 5:00 – 7:00pm

In keeping with the ancient custom of using up all the sweets and fats before the beginning of the Lenten fast, we eat pancakes on Shrove Tuesday. Pancakes conveniently require sugar, butter, eggs, milk, and enriched flour – none of which can be eaten in any great quantity during the fast.

The name for this Tuesday before the beginning of Lent comes from the Old English word *shrive*, a word synonymous with *forgiven*. It was the tradition of the church that people would make a final confession before the beginning of this penitential season. After which, they were said to have been *shriven*.

Ash Wednesday - February 22

Ash Wednesday is the beginning of the Church season of Lent. On Ash Wednesday we gather in penitence and are marked with ashes as a reminder of our mortality. Our journey to Easter begins, and through introspection, prayer, almsgiving, and works of mercy, we rediscover Christ lifting us up from the dirt and ashes and giving us places in his eternal kingdom.

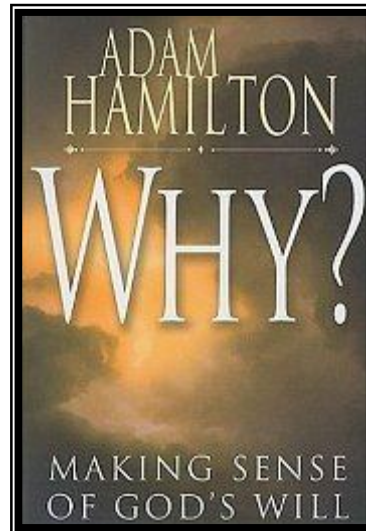

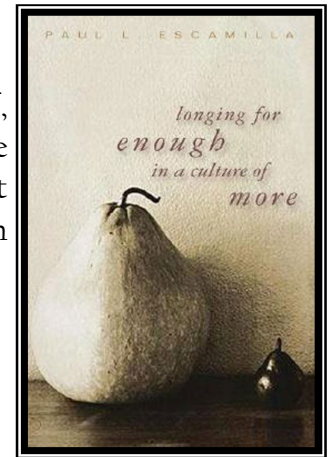

Calling all children to explore the meaning of Lent through food, crafts, toys and lots of fun each week. Find them in Room 208 on the 2nd floor of the Education Building.

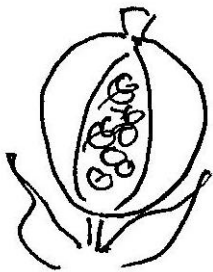
Grades 6-12: A Call to Live

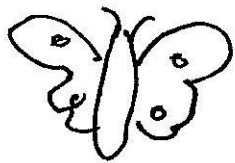
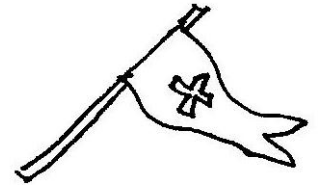

The Resurrection Banner

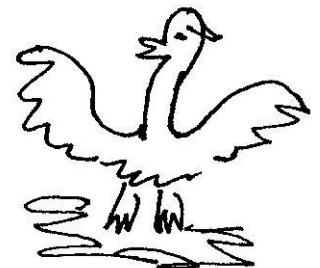
Kitty M. of needle nimble
Will plan and cut and pray
Then appliqué a symbol
In her own artistic way.
The banner is iconic
Certainly laconic
A pictorial array.



The church in ancient times communicated to its illiterate members through stories and symbols. If one knew the story, the symbol was quite wordy. Other than the empty cross, the butterfly may best tell of the resurrection. According to Kitty, “The butterfly leaves its cocoon transformed from a lowly caterpillar [worm!] into a beautiful creature capable of flying into the sky. So it is through Jesus that His followers are borne to a new life.” Add to this the upness of heaven, the blue sky (blue sky’s being St. Mary’s color) and the story develops.



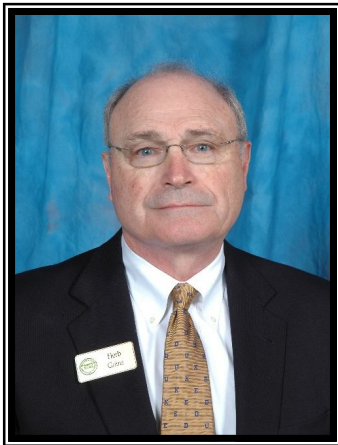
Another creature flying toward heaven is the phoenix, mythical bird with roots in many ancient cultures. The phoenix was destroyed by fire and rose from the ashes to new life. It’s no accident that the bird is gold, untarnishable by time and therefore holy.



Kitty’s banner uses gold again in the pomegranate seeds. Bursting with seeds, the pomegranate represents the power of our Lord to burst from the tomb and come forth.

Beside the pomegranate is the Banner of Victory also known as the Resurrection Banner and of course we see the cross. Observing this symbol, I’d thought our seamstress just didn’t have space for the Lamb of God who is usually seen carrying the banner. Fie on me. They’re two separate symbols. The flag represents the triumph of the Risen Lord over the sin of the world. So I’ve added words to the banner’s symbols. This could detract because one strength of an icon or a symbol is its evoking in the viewer a personal story, perhaps more powerful than any tradition. -*Colleen Hartsoe*

January Vestry Person of the Month



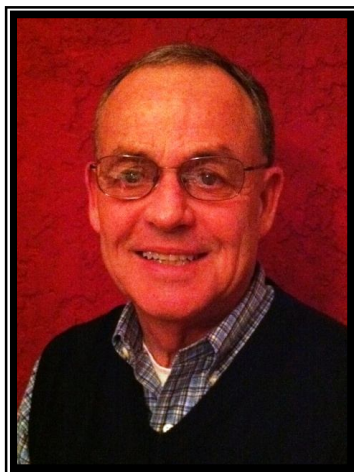

The Youth Choir Training Scheme

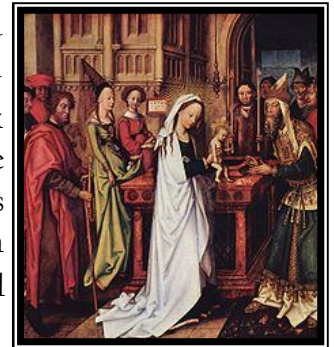
St. Mary's utilizes the Royal School of Church Music (RSCM)'s Voice for Life training scheme. In this scheme, all singers come in as "probationers." During this phase, they learn about fundamentals of music, choir citizenship, and principal church holidays. When they demonstrate knowledge of these things and good basic choir habits, they are admitted to full membership in the choir. At that time, they are awarded a medal bearing the RSCM shield worn on a white ribbon. They also earn the right to wear the white overgarment (surplice) during services.

Following this phase, the singers progress through four more levels, denoted by the color of the ribbon holding their RSCM medal: Light blue, dark blue, red, and yellow. In each phase, they learn about proper singing skills, music reading (theory), music & church history, and citizenship. The reading and audiation skills at the yellow level are approximately that of a college sophomore music major. Good stuff, indeed!

So, do watch our young singers as they progress through their ribbons, demonstrating their burgeoning abilities and knowledge. And please encourage them as they continue on this journey. These youth are not the future of the church -- they are the NOW. -Charles Hogan

Musical Events

Thursday, February 2 - The Presentation of Our Lord Jesus Christ: Choral Evensong with Candlemas Procession at 6:00pm. This ancient holy day is observed by most Anglican, Orthodox, Roman Catholic and Lutheran churches and is a significant link connecting us not only to Christians around the globe, but also to the founders of the Church from the early 4th century. Luke's Gospel (2:22-40) tells of Jesus' parents taking him to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord. There Simeon praised God with what we now know as the *Nunc dimittis*.
