## From the Rector

For all the saints . . .

Lorinda, James, and I are so excited to be moving to be a part of the community at St. Mary’s! James beams when he tells anyone who will listen that at St. Mary’s, they have a church just his size. We can’t figure out whether he’s more pleased about the children’s chapel or the fact that there are soccer and t-ball teams for three year olds in High Point. We’re packing boxes and getting ready for the trek across the state and into a new diocese. Keep us in your prayers as we move in on October 30<sup>th</sup>, and as I look for clerical shirts and vestments amid the crates on the morning of November 1<sup>st</sup>.

All Saints’ day will be our first Sunday with the people of St. Mary’s - and it just so happens that All Saints’ is one of my favorite days in the whole of the church calendar. I particularly love All Saints’ because our celebration of it gives us the chance to ponder one of the more mysterious aspects of our faith. All Saints’ is the day when we remember with special intention all those members of the Body of Christ who have gone before us and with whom, even now, we are mystically knit for all eternity. We call this the communion of saints. When we say in the Eucharistic prayer that we join our voices with angels and archangels and all the company of heaven, we’re talking in part about the communion of saints. The Holy Eucharist is a celebration of cosmic proportions, and we get to be a part of it every time we gather!

Some churches have the tradition of singing a litany of the saints on All Saints’ Day. The litany of which I am most fond allows the people to incorporate the names of loved ones who have died. The people are also encouraged to submit for inclusion the names of other folks they have found to be particularly inspirational in their lives of faith, people like poets, authors, artists, and scientists. The response to each section in which people are named is, “Stand here beside us!” Therefore, the communion of saints is invoked in a real and almost tangible way into the midst of the people gathered.

## A Letter from the Senior Warden

Dear Fellow Parishioners,

By the time you receive this issue of the *Herald*, we will have officially welcomed Lorinda, David, and James into our community and will have begun revealing to them the many facets of our lives together here at St. Mary's. David visited with us yesterday, October 19<sup>th</sup>, and was able to attend the staff meeting and have some individual time with them, the vergers, your junior warden, and with me. I can't wait for each of you to share your knowledge and special feelings for our church with David. We have been members here for over 20 years, and I am still discovering wonderful things about St. Mary's and the personalities, programs, and relationships that make it such a caring place. We will learn, too, of the many gifts the Umphletts bring to share with us. There is much to discover about each other. Let's rejoice in each moment of that process.

At last night's vestry meeting our Deacon, Evelyn Morales, gave an exciting update on the ESL classes held in our Education Building each Tuesday and Thursday evening. There are 54 Latino adults (a record number) this session who are accompanied by almost 30 children who are cared for in our classrooms – a full house, to say the least. Evelyn also organized a clergy conference at St. Mary's, which was attended by over 30 people from a variety of denomi-

nations who came to discuss and learn about immigration issues and opportunities for outreach and collaboration in our area. Many of you have asked about what will happen with Evelyn upon the arrival of our new priest. Sadly, there must be a period of separation and discernment, both for Evelyn and for David. Evelyn has been in conversation with Bishop Curry, and he is very supportive of her continuing with the Latino outreach she facilitates here. However, St. Mary's cannot serve as her liturgical home during this period of discernment. We have been truly blessed by Evelyn's presence here. She has served us in worship with reverence and abiding faith, she has brought special programming to the people of St. Mary's, she has worked closely with many groups in the church, and she has helped to change the lives of countless numbers of our fellow High Pointers. She is, and will continue to be, a good and faithful servant. Let's keep her in our hearts and be open to where God may lead her and us in the future.

As I have said many times, it is a blessing to be serving as your senior warden. I thank you for this opportunity, and I remain faithfully yours.

Pastor Edmund Steimle put it this way: "The Christian story is a story of God coming into the middle of life, of our lives, opening the dialogue with us."

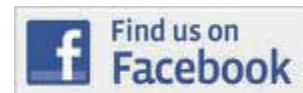
That's what Advent is really all about: God visiting the earth in person to speak with anyone and everyone who is ready to do so.

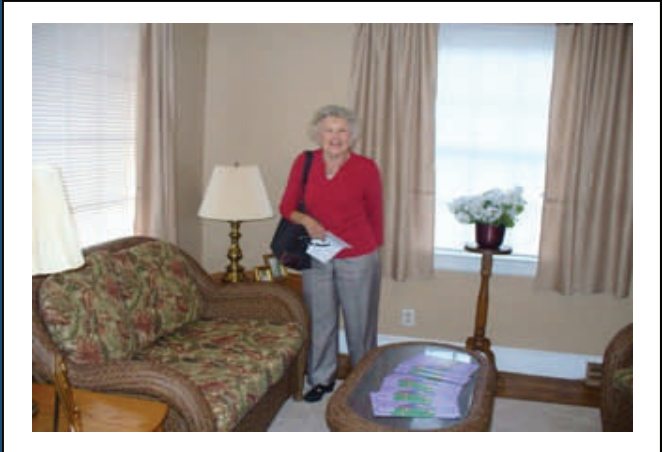
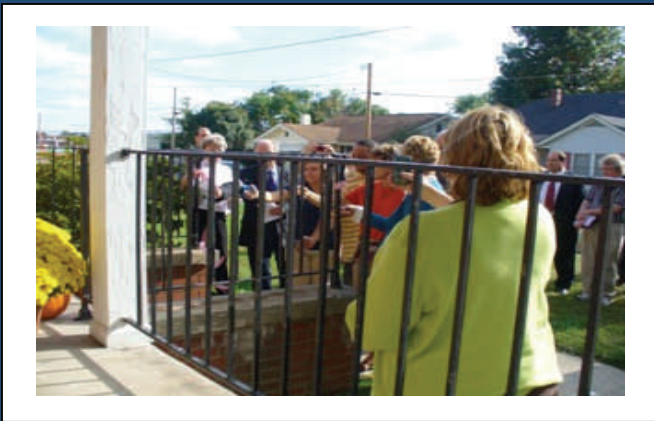

## A Day of Gratitude & Friendship


Most Americans, learning about Thanksgiving's origin, hear or read about the destitute Pilgrims who suffered greatly during their first bitter winter in America. Many Pilgrims got sick, and half of them died.



What we don't focus on enough is the fact that Native Americans took pity on the Pilgrims. They befriended the newcomers and gave them food. They taught them how to survive the vicious cold months.

Then, when the earth grew warm again, the Indians taught the Pilgrims how to grow various crops and how to store any surplus. It was primarily because of the natives' friendship and helpfulness that the Pilgrims began to eke their way from disaster to fruitfulness. It's no wonder that when the Pilgrims had their first successful harvest, they invited their Indian neighbors to celebrate with them. The natives didn't come empty-handed. They furnished venison, wild turkeys and probably vegetables from storage. It was, more or less, a potluck affair. The Pilgrim leaders prayed gratefully at the occasion.

## Veteran's Day

Veterans Day has its roots in what was called Armistice Day, the day when a peace agreement was signed with Germany ending World War I. Armistice Day was established with a proclamation by President Woodrow Wilson, which reads in part: "Armistice Day will be filled with solemn pride in heroism of those who died in the country's service and with gratitude for the victory, both because of the thing from which it has freed us and because of the opportunity it has given America to show her sympathy with peace and justice in the councils of the nations." On June 1, 1954, Armistice Day was renamed Veterans Day to honor all U.S. veterans.

On Veterans Day this year, let us remember and honor those men and women who gave of themselves, and let us continue to pray for our men and women currently serving in the military.

## Returning Thanks

"Life-saving" was a popular extracurricular activity at Northwestern University during the second half of the 19th century. During four decades, students saved more than 400 people from drowning in Lake Michigan. During a nighttime storm on September 8, 1860, Lady Elgin, a steamboat carrying 393 passengers, was hit by a lumber schooner. The steamboat sank, and 287 people drowned. Northwestern sophomore Edward Spencer swam out to offer aid and ended up rescuing 17 people. Apparently, the ordeal was so stressful that Spencer became delirious and was confined to a wheelchair for life. When he turned 80, Spencer was asked to share his most vivid memory of that tragic day. "Not one of the 17 returned to thank me," he replied. This is reminiscent of Jesus' miracle in Luke 17:11-19. Only one of 10 healed lepers returned to thank Jesus for restoring his physical health. God made a tremendous sacrifice to rescue us. We can return thanks to him each day through our love and grateful obedience.
